40th Annual Pow Wow

May 12th and 13th

Grand Entry at noon on Saturday and Sunday

→ The Dartmouth Green (Rain Location: TBD)

The Dartmouth Pow-Wow serves as an opportunity for members of both the Dartmouth and Upper Valley communities to observe, participate, and learn from a broad representation of Native American Dances, music, and arts and crafts. Pursuant to the function of the Pow-Wow, three key elements need to be in place:

- <u>Drum Group</u>: They are designated to sing the first song each day. The song can be viewed as an opening prayer offered before a gathering. It consists of ten members.
- <u>Woman Dancer</u>: She is appointed to lead all dancers in and out of the dancing arena at the start and end of the Pow-Wow. She is appointed this great honor for her experience and age.
- <u>Man Dancer</u>: He, along with the Head Woman Dancer, leads the contestants in the Grand Entry at the beginning of the Pow-Wow.

The Native Americans at Dartmouth (NAD) and Native American Program (NAP) have hosted the Dartmouth Pow-Wow since 1973. The Dartmouth Pow-Wow is recognized as a Dartmouth tradition, and has received positive recognition from across the United States. It has blessed the Dartmouth and neighboring communities with a lasting awareness of Native Americans and their culture, attracting over one thousand on-lookers annually.

- Instead of just introducing new concepts, this course focuses on specific competencies, which create sustainable culture change around inclusion and diversity. This all day class goes beyond awareness and looks at five strategic ways that will enhance the qualities of interpersonal communication and engagement.
- Although issues of race and gender are not neglected in this workshop—diversity is a much broader concern. A new definition is therefore presented as "any difference that makes a difference." This allows participants to consider what differences might be causing disconnects for them and the organization. By the same token, inclusion is not about having diversity—it's about valuing differences in a way that helps everyone succeed.
