Exploring Research Experiences

There are a range of possible research experiences you can engage in. Some of these possibilities include:

• Be a research assistant at Dartmouth or elsewhere.

DARTMOUTH

- Start with one research experience and then shift to a topic of particular interest.
- Conduct ongoing research and/or have a full off-term immersive research experience.
- Focus on lab/science research or clinical research; non-biomedical topics (public health, economics, anthropology, art, etc.).
- Sign up for an independent research project for course credit.
- Complete a thesis for course credit.

As you explore your research options, it is important to consider the following questions:

- Do you have a specific topic or area of interest you wish to explore?
- Do you have a specific person in mind you would like to work with and receive mentorship from?
- Do you have a specific location or organization you would like to conduct research?

Your answers to these questions will help to determine what kind of research experience best suits your interests and needs. As many Dartmouth students do, you could build your own research experience, which may require you to craft and send cold emails, plus continuous follow-up and coordination. Dartmouth faculty from any academic department, Geisel faculty, The Dartmouth Institute (TDI – Dartmouth's public health school), and DHMC staff and faculty are accessible to Dartmouth undergrads. You could also apply to a structured research program, which would require you to track deadlines, eligibility, start dates, and submit an application and possibly letters of recommendation.

On and Off Campus Resources

Whether you decide to build your own research experience or apply to a structured research program, there are many resources both on and off campus for you to explore.

Dartmouth Resources

- HPP: We can discuss you ideas and options, as well as strategies for outreach. Our Pre-Health Peer Mentors can also share their experiences and tips/advice. Check out their bios <u>HERE</u>!
- <u>Undergraduate Advising & Research</u>: Oversees several programs that provide students with the opportunity to conduct research with a Dartmouth faculty mentor. Also, provides information about <u>internal and external sources of funding</u>.
- <u>Center for Professional Development</u>: Provides a wide range of services, including opportunities for research and funding, internship/job opportunities, career coaching, application assistance, interview preparation, and other professional development opportunities. The CPD also manages <u>Handshake</u>, a job board for students.
- John Sloan Dickey Center for International Understanding: Offers several programs, internship/fellowship, and funding opportunities that broaden students' scope of learning

through advanced study, interdisciplinary collaboration, research innovation, and respect for a diversity of viewpoints.

- Nelson A. Rockefeller Center: Offers opportunities for research and funding with a focus on public policy and teaching.
- Check out academic departments' websites (either at Dartmouth or elsewhere). Many will have a "people" page where you can look up what faculty are researching.
- Connect with alumni through the <u>Dartmouth Alumni LinkedIn</u>.

Other Ways to Find Research

- Check out medical schools' websites and see what faculty members there are researching. You can also look up if medical schools have research and/or clinical programs available for undergraduate students.
- Network: Ask your family member, friends, peers, professors, advisors, alumni, etc. for ideas or connections.
- Google! Search for opportunities using keywords and phrases, such as "maternal health research at Columbia University."
